In downtown Lake City, South Carolina, a poignant reminder of a tragic past stands tall - "The Lynching of Frazier Baker." Frazier Baker, appointed as Lake City's first African American postmaster in 1897, faced unyielding opposition from the white community. Despite enduring threats and attacks, Baker bravely fulfilled his duties until tragedy befell him. Representative James E. Clyburn's endeavors to honor Baker's memory have since galvanized courage and leadership in others.

During the Dedication Ceremony, elected officials and community members, including myself, convened to acknowledge the town's history while embracing a forward trajectory. Mayor Lovith Anderson, Jr. underscored the significance of confronting the past, affirming, "The way to move forward is to admit that it has happened, and then we can start our healing process."

Clyburn's resolute commitment to progress transcends mere legislative endeavors. His advocacy for the Affordable Care Act stands as a testament to his unwavering dedication to effecting transformative change, prioritizing the well-being of millions of Americans despite fierce opposition and short-term political considerations.

Reflecting on my own journey, I recall grappling with self-doubt and anxiety during my school years. The narrative embodied by leaders like James E. Clyburn has profoundly influenced my conception of authentic leadership, especially in my school.

A pivotal moment in my educational journey unfolded during my junior year of high school when I was tasked with spearheading a fundraising initiative for a fellow student named Grace Anna. Grace Anna, a member of the National Honor Society, required a service dog named Dublin to mitigate life-threatening seizures and safely pursue her college education. However, the financial burden of acquiring Dublin, not covered by insurance, posed a formidable obstacle for Grace Anna and her family.

Determined to effect change, my NHS team and I embarked on a rigorous threeweek fundraising campaign, mobilizing the entire community in our endeavor. Through perseverance and collaboration, we exceeded our initial fundraising goal, amassing \$758.25 in funds. The day Grace Anna welcomed Dublin into her life marked a triumph for us all. Witnessing the tangible impact of our efforts in enabling her to pursue her educational aspirations filled us with profound pride and fulfillment.

As I observed students, parents, and community members converging to support our cause, I experienced an overwhelming sense of pride and achievement. In that moment, I recognized the true essence of leadership - not in grandiose gestures or accolades, but in the everyday actions and decisions that inspire collective progress.

Inspired by Clyburn's example, I have endeavored to advocate for positive change within my school and community. I aspire to embody the ethos of courage and leadership instilled by figures such as him.
