

Customers enrolled in the Off-Peak Plan are not charged any additional fees compared to a customer on our basic residential rate.

However, the “Explanation of Bill Detail” section of the two bills are itemized differently. In this video, you’ll learn how to navigate a side by side comparison of a Schedule 1 bill, our basic customer rate, and a bill on Schedule 1G, the Off-Peak Plan.

On the basic residential rate, the Distribution Service line item represents three components: the basic customer charge of \$6.58, the cost to distribute the electricity consumed, and all applicable distribution riders

These three charges are listed as one line item, Distribution Service.

However, on the Off-Peak Plan, all three components are presented separately under the Distribution Service heading.

On the basic residential bill, the Generation line item represents the cost to generate the electricity consumed that month plus all other applicable riders.

On the Off-Peak Plan bill, the cost to generate the electricity consumed that month is broken out by tier.

And all other applicable generations riders are listed separately, under the All Other Applicable ESS Riders heading.

On the basic residential bill, the Transmission line item represents the cost to move the electricity consumed that month plus all other applicable riders.

On the Off-Peak Plan bill, the Transmission line item represents the cost to move the electricity consumed that month.

And all other applicable transmission riders are listed separately, under the All Other Applicable ESS Riders heading.
